Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation

This summer, I organized a division-wide fundraiser through an organization called Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation, which raises money for childhood cancer research "one cup at a time."

The organization was founded by a four-year-old girl, Alexandra "Alex" Scott, who was diagnosed with a form of childhood cancer before the age of one. She held lemonade stands up until her tragic death at the age of eight, raising over \$1 million for cancer research. As of today, Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation (ALSF) is a national organization

that has raised over \$25 million to support more than 80 different research projects. ALSF is supported by individuals and groups who hold lemonade stands across America every day.

We had about six volunteers helping at our division-wide event, and we raised \$173 for ALSF! I have found that the best way to raise money is by not setting a specific price on the product. Instead of saying, for example, that each cup of lemonade cost \$1, we told customers that we were accepting donations. That way, people were unsure of how much to donate, so they typically donated more. We received payments of up to \$20

just from one person alone!

To get started, visit ALSF's website, www.alexslemonade.org, and register a stand. They will send you an envelope full of materials to get your stand moving, such as posters, banners, coupons for lemonade mix, and more. Once you receive the packet in the mail, simply hold your stand, and send in the money in the pre-paid envelope they provide you with. It's so easy!
